Wonderful Progress on the GRHGC Cataloging Project

If you're searching the Germantown library catalog for genealogy items, you may now have an easier time of finding what you're looking for. The purpose of the cataloging project is to repair and update the records for the materials currently housed in our library. The records were added to the catalog using the list that TNGS maintained when they donated the materials to the Germantown library in 2006. The records were not properly formatted at that time for use in the online catalog and did not contain complete subject headings.

In the last 16 months, cataloger **Octavia Ashby** has fixed the records of 1,987 items. These include records for the international books and the states of Arkansas, Oregon, Colorado, Minnesota, and all of the West Tennessee counties. She is currently working on the records for the state of Mississippi with about one quarter of them completed. Also, **Caroline Floyd** has just been hired to assist with the cataloging project. She is working on the records for the state of Virginia.
