TNGS and GRHGC Receive Grant Awards

On January 24, the Tennessee Genealogical Society and the Germantown Regional History and Genealogy Center were each awarded grants of \$2,000 from the Tennessee Historical Records Advisory Board (THRAB). Funding for these grants comes from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC). The grants were presented to TNGS and GRHGC by **Tennessee State Senator Brian Kelsey**.

TNGS will use the grant money for the Voices of the Memphis Belle oral history project. The original recorded interviews of the Memphis Belle crew on cassette tape will be digitized and transcribed to preserve the records for future generations.

GRHGC plans to use their grant money to index and preserve their numerous vertical files.

Dear Members,


As I sit here this frosty winter day, I see the sun shining and anticipate much warmer weather. Don't you? Make your plans now so the warm weather starts you off right!

Meet Aaron Hatch

A native of Dyersburg, Tennessee, **Aaron Hatch** has been interested in genealogy at least 50 years. He fondly remembers playing on the banks of the Mississippi River and hearing stories of his family history. He was told that Davy Crockett was his ancestor, and he is still trying to find that link to this day.

Aaron gives back to the genealogy community by serving as TNGS's Business Manager. He has also volunteered as the Program Coordinator for the Olive Branch Genealogy Club for the last nine years. Aaron is an active volunteer with his neighborhood watch group. He previously served as a block captain, and now serves as the group's leader.

At 8 years of age Aaron moved with his family to Memphis. He graduated from Memphis Technical High School and began college at Memphis State University. His studies were interrupted by service in the Army Signal Corps during the Vietnam War where he was stationed in Phu Bai, Vietnam. He worked as an electronic repairman repairing crypto equipment. He also worked as a crypto repairman for NASA in the Canary Islands for a short time. Returning to college at MSU, Aaron graduated with an accounting degree.

Fondly Remembering Mary Louise Nazor

Former TNGS volunteer, **Mary Louise Nazor**, passed away on February 11, 2019. Her ancestors were in Shelby County by 1832 and 1854. Mary Louise was interested in Memphis/Shelby County history and genealogy for many years.

Past TNGS President, **Jim Bobo**, remembers Mary Louise: "With her background in academia, and her skills in research and writing, Mary Louise's passion was **Ansearchin' News**. She joined the

editorial staff in 1982, and later served as associate editor. She and the other staff members made this magazine, 'the best regional genealogy magazine in the Nation.'

"Mary Louise and I probably had the classic "love/hate" relationship when it came to the Society. We never completely agreed on the evolution of the organization, but one of my most pleasant memories is, in 2015, when she told me the Society and its collection is exactly where it should be."

Mary Louise had a master's degree in library science and worked as a librarian in the Memphis City Schools. Mary Louise was a member of these organizations: Early Settlers of Shelby County and Surrounding Counties, **Tennessee Genealogical Society**, West Tennessee Historical Society, and she was a member of the Shelby County Historical Commission. She was a member of the Episcopal Church.
