Quarterly Members' Meeting

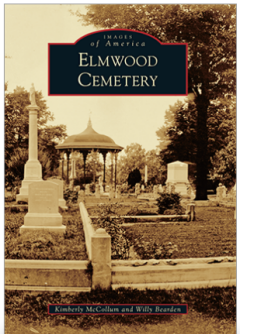
Saturday, July 15, 2017 at 10 a.m.

The Quarterly Members Meeting of the Tennessee Genealogical Society will be held on Saturday, July 15th, at 10:00 a.m. at the Tennessee Genealogical Society, 7779 Poplar Pike, Germantown, TN.

We encourage all members to attend this meeting as we focus on a wonderful resource of information that can be found at Elmwood Cemetery. Author **Kimberly Bearden** is our special guest!

Refreshments will be served.

Following the meeting, **Kimberly Bearden** will tell us about how she and **Willie Bearden** came about gathering 150 years of images from the Memphis Room at the Memphis Public Library and Special Collections at the University of Memphis Libraries. Kimberly will share some the images and the stories of the people who rest at Elmwood in their resouce, *Elmwood Cemetery*.



Elmwood Cemetery was founded in August 1852 by 50 prominent Memphians who resolved to create a new burial site just two and a half miles outside the city limits. The name of the cemetery was drawn out of a hat by one of the founding fathers. A nurseryman from Scotland was hired to lay out the grounds, and Elmwood was opened to people from all backgrounds to use as their family cemetery. Elmwood has survived wars, military occupation, epidemic disease, and the bankruptcy and near collapse of Memphis, only to emerge as one of the premier outdoor museums in the United States. Its massive collection of Victorian memorial statuary is almost unrivaled, but Elmwood's true allure lies in the stories of those who rest beneath the lush canopy of trees on its 80 acres. The graves at Elmwood belong to soldiers and statesmen, scoundrels and scalawags, writers and musicians, martyrs and madams, the notorious and the anointed, and so many more.

TGS Supports New Bethel Cemetery Project

The Tennessee Genealogy Society is very proud that **Joe Burns**, past TNGS president, connected us with the University North Alabama-Florence professors **Dr. George Makowski** and **Dr. Analey Quiros** professors and the New Bethel Missionary Baptist Church on Poplar Pike. The professors brought eleven students and a videographer from Vassar College to provide some hands-on learning. They interviewed members of the New Bethel congregation to help create a publicly accessible history of the church and its congregation.



The students from UNA worked with the New Bethel Church members gathering oral history and with the Tennessee Genealogical Society they learned how to help digitize the history of the church both on paper and oral history. They learned how to map the marked and unmarked graves. One day the TNGS paid for the students and workers to attend a class at Elmwood Cemetery here in Memphis about how to properly clean and take care of gravestones. **Kelly Sowell**, Elmwood Historian was the class instructor for that session.



As the group completed the physical work of mapping the 250-300 marked graves in the cemetery, they met with the church families and collected a great deal of information from the oral histories to learn about those people. Students used clues they learned in the classroom. By using rods that go down in the earth to determine if the earth was disturbed they figured out where others were buried. Special thanks to the TNGS and others for providing lunches. We appreciate **Joe Burns, John Ware, Kitty Cox, Sandra Beibers, Catherine Wilson, and Andy Pouncey**.

Dr. Makowski said, "What we're doing is building skills for our students and for the volunteers, who are here working with them, whether they are from the church or the genealogical society, spreading that idea that 'Hey, we can do this!'"
