Our ambitious aim for these next two years is to make the delights and rewards of genealogical research of our members even more enjoyable because of our planned program of providing instruction for the novice and original source material for all.

Mrs. Charles G. Young, our dedicated and most able retiring Librarian, brought us up to date on the accomplishments of her Committee. The Society will always be grateful for her work and for her assistance in helping us to "grow up". At a later time we hope to say more about the books and microfilms acquired by the Society and now deposited in the Reference Department of Cossitt Library in Memphis. Thank you, Mrs. Young! Now, you see some of the reasons why the new officers must indeed extend their efforts to keep pace and show progress.

On January 8th and 9th Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Gardiner, Mrs. Harry O'Hara, Mrs. James B. Cartwright, Mrs. I. G. Duncan, Mrs. J. D. Young and Mrs. L. D. The sessions were informative and the associations pleasant. All returned with refreshing new ideas and perhaps inspired to "go and do likewise".

Just received - a copy of LIFE AND TIMES OF DAVID SMITH - PATRIOT, PIONEER AND INDIAN FIGHTER by May Wilson McBee, River Road, Greenwood, Mississippi, 85 pages, hard back printed book. Mrs. McBee in her Preface says, "The practice of having each ancestor really live in his era and locale is largely responsible for this LIFE AND TIMES. But perhaps not enough consideration has been given the fact that FATE moved my subject quite often on the checkboard of LIFE, and in long frequent 'jumps'. This created scattered backgrounds and a variety of people. The saga of David Smith begins on the battlefield of Culloden Moor in the Scottish Highlands, then on to the PeeDee Country of North Carolina, on to King's Mountain and Fort Panmur at the Natchez, and to Horseshoe Bend with Andrew Jackson". The book is interestingly written and fully documented.

Mrs. Bonnie S. Ball, Haysi, Virginia a member of our Society sent a copy of her <u>RED TRAILS AND WHITE</u> - The Mysterious Life of Caty Sage - for our library collection. RESEARCH IN GEORGIA

Excerpts taken from a paper given by Mrs. James B. Cartwright at the October 19, 1959 meeting of the Memphis Genealogical Society.

GEORGIA - land of peaches, goobers, and crackers, bounded on the north by North Carolina and Tennessee, northeast by South Carolina and the Atlantic Ocean, South by Florida and on the west by Alabama, last of the thirteen original colonies to be established, named for George II, King of England, by General James Edward Oglethorpe when he received the Charter to found the colony in June 1732.

GEORGIA - battleground of three wars: the Revolution, the War of 1812, and the War Between the States.

GEORGIA - crossroads in the stream of migration funneling westward from the seaboard into the newly opened lands made peaceful by treaties with the Indians.

GEORGIA - mild in climate, with a broad coastal plain, a higher but still fertile plateau called the Piedmont, and only a small area made less accessible by the Southern ends of the Appalachian Mountain chain.

Let us take a closer look at the past history of this State through which so many of our ancestors passed either on their way into Texas and farther West through Mississippi, or others who turned northward through Tennessee before venturing westward.

Georgia was founded by General Oglethorpe and a band of benevolent men bent primarily on providing a refuge for the religiously persecuted people of Europe and the worthy indigent of England. Let us settle here the misconception that all the early settlers of Georgia were debtors freed from the English prisons. Salzburgers (German Lutherans), Moravians, Italians, Portuguese, Jews and many Scottish along with the English were early settlers. And the use of the word worthy sheds a somewhat different light on the type of Englishmen who accompanied Oglethorpe and were a part of the 161 who landed at Yamacraw Bluff on February 12, 1733 to found the city of Savannah in the State of Georgia. Savannah Jewry was unique in that it was the only Jewish community to arrive within a month of the founding of a colony and immediately form a congregation. The Charter from King George granted the colony the land within their North and South Boundaries from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean, but Oglethorpe adopted the wise policy of purchasing all lands from the Indians. Until the Revolutionary War there were no serious clashes between the old and the new Georgians. The fact that the Colony would serve as an excellent buffer between the Carolinas and the encroachments of the Spanish in Florida and the French in Louisiana had greatly influenced the English King to favor Oglethorpe's request for a Charter. The colony was a strategic success, but not so economically. The Trustees required the settlers to plant mulberry trees for the culture of silkworms, wine grapes, hemp, and to grow medical plants, for all of which England was dependent on from foreign countries. Slaves were prohibited until 1749 when the need for labor became so apparent that the Trustees removed their ban. In 1752 the Trustees surrendered their Charter and Georgia became a Crown Colony. A period of prosperity immediately followed, and the main tide of immigration from Virginia and the Carolinas began at this time. Because of their prosperity Georgians were led to revolt against the British mainly through sympathy with the other colonies rather than because of their own grievances. Loyalist sentiment was strong in Georgia, especially in the coastal areas where a profitable trade with England existed. Many skirmishes took place between the Tories and the Patriots. These Loyalists

as the British sympathizers were called, later lost their land through confiscation, many fled to Nassau and Bermuda, or returned to England.

Representatives from Georgia went to the Continental Congress, and the Georgia signers of the Declaration of Independence were Button Gwinnett, Lyman Hall, and George Walton. Savannah was captured by the British in 1778, Augusta fell in 1779. Augusta was retaken by Gen. Elijah Clarke following the Battle of Kettle Creek, but after the defeat of the Americans, and the French before Savannah, and the fall of Charleston, S. C. in 1780, most of Georgia was overrun by the British. British forces were not withdrawn until July of 1782. On January 2, 1788 a convention at Augusta ratified the Constitution of the United States and Georgia was admitted as the fourth State of the Union.

After the Revolution, Georgia claimed all the land from the Carolinas south to latitude 30°21'39", the Florida border, and West to the Mississippi River. The so called "Yazoo Frauds" marked the beginning of a bitter struggle with the Federal Government over title to these western lands. In 1795 the Georgia Legislature had granted for \$500,000 territory comprising almost all of Mississippi and half of Alabama to four land Companies. Georgia rescinded the Grant the next year, but the Federal Government pronounced the claim invalid and set up a Territorial Government, giving up all claim. The Federal Government, in return agreed to pay Georgia the sum of \$1,250,000 and was, at Federal expense, to extinguish all Indian titles to land in the State of Georgia. The United States government was dilatory, and it was 1838 before all the Cherokee lands were evacuated.

Georgians participated in the War of 1812 mainly in General Andrew Jackson's campaign against the Indian allies of the British. A large force of volunteers also was sent to the Mexican War.

Georgia seceded from the Union on January 19, 1861. Alexander H. Stephens of Georgia became Vice-President of the Confederacy. Georgia sent 94 Regiments and 34 Battalions into the War Between the States, and was a principal source of food and supplies for Southern armies. It was this economic importance which led to General William T. Sherman's campaign and march from Atlanta to the sea, in which the loss of property and records in the state was disastrous. Reconstruction marked the change from food growing to the production of cotton in many areas. On the whole the Reconstruction period was one of moderation in Georgia, but the state was not wholly free of the "carpetbaggers" until 1877. In the Spanish American War Georgia furnished more volunteers in proportion to population than did any other state.

Now against this background of history, let us discuss actual genealogical research in the State of Georgia. Do not despair immediately if the trail leads to Georgia. Research in Georgia can be just as rewarding or just as frustrating as research in any other state can be. Georgia's genealogical ledger has many assets and liabilities. To be positive first, the greatest asset is the capable, enthusiastic, Director of the Georgia Department of Archives and History in Atlanta, Mrs. Mary Givens Bryan. Mrs. Bryan is not only acutely interested in preserving the vital, all important State and County records of Georgia, but she has concerned herself actively with making these records ever more available and useful to the researcher in family history. Many a State Archivist so jealously guards his records and papers, that they are unknown to and inaccessible to the average researcher. Mrs. Bryan's long range program of conservation envelopes the microfilming of the records of all Georgia counties set up prior to 1833. These records are brought into Atlanta where they are microfilmed, laminated, and indexed if one is needed and then they are returned to the County. The microfilm record is available at the Department of Archives and History in Atlanta. Two photographers from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (Mormon) have recently been participating in the microfilm project on a cooperative basis since the Georgia Legislature's appropriation did not provide funds enough for the speed of work which Mrs. Bryan wished. Currently about 25 of the 48 pre-1833 Counties have been completed. Some records have also been gathered from Counties of later date where there have been destructive fires. Mrs. Bryan has taken an active part in working for Legislation necessary to implement her program for record preservation, and for the appropriation of funds for a modern fireproof Archives Building to replace the present obsolete and inadequate quarters on Peachtree Street. When Mrs. Bryan's long range program is completed there can be no complete loss of early county records through fire as has been the case so often in the past.

This leads us to the debit side of the ledger. General Sherman's "scorched earth" has long ago "greened up", but Sherman will always remain the symbol of vandalism to any genealogical sleuth whose trail dead-ends in a burned county. There are many of these counties whose records have been destroyed, by either one, or a series of fires, in cases, of course, <u>some</u> of the records were saved. To add to the already gloomy picture is the disheartening fact that the first three Federal Census reports for Georgia 1790, 1800 and 1810 were destroyed when the British troops captured Washington during the 1812 conflict. This is what is <u>not</u> there.

The following are some of the records which are available and which help, somewhat, to compensate for the loss of so many vital records. In the Archives in Atlanta there is an index to all the Land Grants, including the Head-right, Bounty and Purchase Grants from Colonial days. These give the County of residence, and the County in which the land was surveyed, the number of acres and the year. Of very special value, next, is the Land Lottery of 1805. Let me settle here the confusion over this date. This Lottery has been referred to also as the Lottery of 1803. Authority for the Lottery was given in the Georgia Legislative Act of May 11, 1803, but the drawing was not held until 1805. Mrs. Bryan calls this the Lottery of 1805. This list of drawers was unique in that for the only time in any of the Georgia Lotteries, the name of every person eligible to draw was listed. This list is well indexed in Atlanta but has never been published. The second Lottery, known as the Lottery of 1807 is also referred to as the Lottery of 1806. The Act authorizing it was dated June 26, 1806, but the drawing took place in 1807. This Lottery, also is well indexed but unpublished. These two Lotteries provide an excellent substitute for the 1800, and the 1810 Census reports. Unfortunately this second lottery listed only the successful drawers, and not everyone eligible. All following Lottery lists contained only the names of the successful drawers. Other Lotteries were held in the years 1820, 1821, 1827, and 1832. Bounty Land Warrants had been satisfied mostly in the counties of Franklin and Washington, the 1805 Lottery distributed land in Baldwin, Wayne and Wilkinson, the 1807 in the counties of Baldwin and Wilkinson. The entire subject of Georgia's Land Grants and Lotteries has been very concisely treated by Mrs. Bryan in an article entitled "Land Grants in Georgia" which appeared in March 1956 issue of the National Genealogical Society Quarterly pages 1-7. In this article are summarized the very important facts about each Lottery, including Authority, Year of Drawing, Counties, Size of Land Lots, Grant Fee, and Persons Entitled to Draw. Resumes entitled: Bounty Grants, Head-Right Grants, and Grants by Purchase are also included. Mimeographed copies are available from the Georgia Department of Archives and History without charge.

Another substitute for the missing Census records may be found in the County Tax Lists for the early years wherever these have survived. The Georgia Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution have long been active in the collection and preservation of the genealogical and historical records of their State, and it was through a D.A.R. sponsored Legislative bill that the Department of Archives and History was founded in 1918. Their activities have resulted in the accumulation of approximately 2000 volumes housed in the Georgia Department of Archives and History. A catalogue of this collection was published in 1956 and is available from the Department. It contains 232 pages, listing alphabetically family names, the Counties of Georgia, and the States other than Georgia from which records were copied, and indicates in each case the type of records which have been copied. This book is a paperback entitled "Catalogue of the Georgia Society, D.A.R. Library in the Georgia Department of Archives and History". It's cost is \$1.00. Also available from the Department of Archives and History, is Hall's map of 1838 at a cost of \$1.00 also. This map is of particular use because it shows the "present and original Counties and Land Districts". The genealogy of the County is of tremendous aid in showing where to seek the earliest records for a particular locality.

Mention should also be made here of the retirement in 1958 of Mr. Alex M. Hitz. Mrs. Pat Bryant has been appointed Deputy Surveyor General in his place, and all queries regarding land transactions at the <u>State</u> level should be addressed to her.

The published books on Georgia have purposely not been touched upon. The perusal of the card catalogue of any good genealogical library will at once show the wealth of published histories of Georgia counties, and the like.

The purpose of this paper has been to give a background of history of Georgia, a quick summary of very helpful records available for the most part in Atlanta, and indirectly, a greater appreciation for those fortunate states which have not suffered the loss of records which has been the fate of Georgia.

Be aware that, even where loss of records has been severe there are often substitutes, round about ways to prove a lineage, and always the bright hope that someday, somewhere, someone will find a long lost family record which will open new lines, and introduce you to new ancestors long cut off from you because of incomplete official records.
